## NORD 2017

We're very proud to announce that two of our Scouts – Mackenzie Tudor and Jess McKay, have been selected to join the Mersey Weaver contingent heading to NORD 2017 – the world's northernmost Jamboree!

Here's what Jess had to say about the upcoming adventure...

"NORD 2017 is a world Jamboree held in Norway. Scouts from all around the world will be attending this great experience."

"Out of the whole of England, only 29 people are going, but only if we raise enough! In total, we have to raise £33,000 – so every penny we raise counts."

"At Norway, we will be doing many things – including experiencing the life of a Norwegian. The first week will be spent at a beautiful campsite found in the centre of a few mountains."

"During the first week, we'll be taking 2 days out to go on an expedition. Where we'll be hiking out into the mountains to camp elsewhere for a night, before heading back to the main camp."

"From cooking for ourselves, to trying not to die, we are all very excited! Where we'll be camping, there will be 23 hours of daylight – so sleeping will be very difficult!"

"After a week camping, we will be going to a Norwegian home as part of our Home Hospitality, where we will live with them for a week, experiencing the life of a typical Norwegian teenager!"

### About the Cheshire Hike

The Cheshire Hike is an annual competition open to all Scouts and Guides in Cheshire.

The 2017 Hike will be our 51st and will be held from the 1<sup>st</sup> April to the 2<sup>nd</sup> April.

Cheshire Hike is real challenge for all those who take part but with careful planning and good training you can succeed. There will be a real sense of achievement when you complete this special challenge.

Teams must be made up of 2 Scouts or Guides and enter in one of these categories:

- Junior (11 – 12½) – Distance: 19km Sat; 12km Sun
- Intermediate (12½ - 14) – Distance: 25km Sat; 16km Sun
- Senior (14 – 16) – Distance: 29km Sat; 19km Sun
- Senior Plus (16 – 18) – Distance: 34km Sat; 19km Sun)







## Adult Volunteers - Leaders

Leaders are a very important part of the Scouting movement, mostly because they generously give up their own time to inspire a generation of young people to experience fun, friendship and real adventure.

We asked our Scouts what they think that the Leaders do – here is what they come up with...

### Paddy wrote:

"Scout Leaders use their personal time to create days out for Leaders and Scouts alike. Sometimes it is a small BBQ or a big event like the Water Weekend Camps."

"They make sure activities are fun, and more importantly safe! When activities involve an element of danger, they take every precaution to ensure is safe."

### Ryan wrote:

"Our leaders help us with camping skills, backwards cooking, using an axe and saw, and basic survival skills."

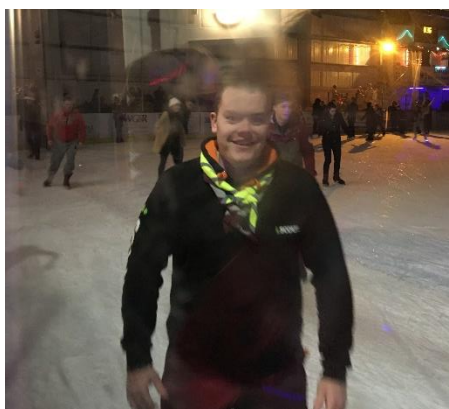
"I really like our leaders because they help us with things that we need help with – this can range from camping to assisting with completing badge work."
